1. Objetivos de la materia

El objetivo del curso es analizar y discutir las teorías y la evidencia empírica sobre el desempeño económico de distintos países y regiones en diferentes períodos de la historia económica mundial. Ello permitirá analizar el desarrollo económico, examinado este último en distintos momentos del tiempo. Se examinarán experiencias y eventos de la historia económica de Europa, África, Asia y América. El curso recogerá los recientes desarrollos empíricos en historia económica.

2. Contenido

El curso se divide en cinco partes. La primera es una introducción a la historia económica y a la relación de esta con los resultados económicos actuales. Se hará énfasis en la discusión sobre las instituciones, la geografía y cultura como determinantes fundamentales del desempeño económico. A su vez, habrá lecturas aplicadas a casos específicos de países relacionando la historia con los resultados económicos actuales. La segunda parte cubre la literatura más reciente sobre el surgimiento de la agricultura, el mundo antiguo, la edad media y la transición al mundo moderno. La tercera parte cubre los siglos XVI y XVII (la Edad Moderna Temprana), presentando los efectos económicos del descubrimiento de América, la creación del mercado trasatlántico, y los cambios en los sistemas políticos y económicos en Europa. La cuarta parte abarca el período 1700 - 1850 y cubre los antecedentes de la Revolución Industrial, la Revolución Francesa, la decadencia del Imperio Español y la independencia de las colonias americanas. La quinta sección analiza la expansión del capitalismo en el siglo XIX, la Revolución Industrial y el proceso de globalización que comienza a finales del siglo XIX.

3. Metodología

La aproximación a los temas se hará en orden cronológico a partir de lecturas de diversos historiadores económicos. Las lecturas son de carácter transversal con el fin de realizar comparaciones entre economías y establecer patrones de convergencia y divergencia. Los textos en su mayoría son documentos de investigación de gran relevancia internacional que se apoyan en herramientas econométricas o estadísticas para sustentar sus hipótesis.

4. Competencias

Al finalizar el curso, los estudiantes contarán con una visión global y analítica de los grandes cambios estructurales que determinaron la historia económica mundial en el periodo de estudio.

5. Criterios de Evaluación (Porcentajes de cada evaluación)

La clase de Historia Económica Mundial es intensiva en lectura, por lo cual la evaluación se realizará de cuatro maneras:

- Ensayos cortos (25%): ensayos quincenales basados en las lecturas obligatorias asignadas vistas o no en clase, buscando responder varias preguntas o desarrollar temáticas - específicas y/o transversales.
- Informes de arbitraje (5%). Resumen de artículos de revista indexada o de libro siguiendo la metodología de “referee report”
- Exposiciones (10%): presentación de alguna de las lecturas del programa. La duración es de 30 minutos y debe realizarse en formato Power Point o LaTeX. Cada estudiante deberá llevar a cabo entre una o dos exposiciones.
- Parciales (30%): evaluaciones que podrán realizarse en clase o por fuera de clase. Serán 3 parciales durante el semestre, cada uno con un valor del 10% de la nota.
- Trabajo Final (25%): consiste en la elaboración de un análisis acerca de:
 - a. un episodio en la historia (ej. las consecuencias económicas de las guerras napoleónicas, la política fiscal y la revolución francesa, etc.)
 - b. una política económica en la historia (ej. la llegada del libre comercio a Europa, la política de migración en América Latina en el siglo XIX y sus consecuencias)
 - c. la historia económica de alguna sociedad durante determinado periodo (ej. desarrollo exportador en Brasil a finales del siglo XIX, la decadencia española en el siglo XVIII, etc.).
- Asistencia y participación en clase (5%). Se restará un punto porcentual (1%) por cada inasistencia injustificada (ver reglamento estudiantil artículo 43).

6. Sistema de aproximación de notas definitivas

La aproximación de la nota final del curso se hará al decimal superior más cercano. Así, si al computar todas las notas del semestre de un estudiante el valor obtenido es 3.01 se aproxima a 3.1, si se obtiene 4.24 se aproxima a 4.3, si se obtiene, 4.91, se aproxima a 5.0, etc.
